That's great! We encourage you to replace old plants or bare sections with native plants to add more variety.

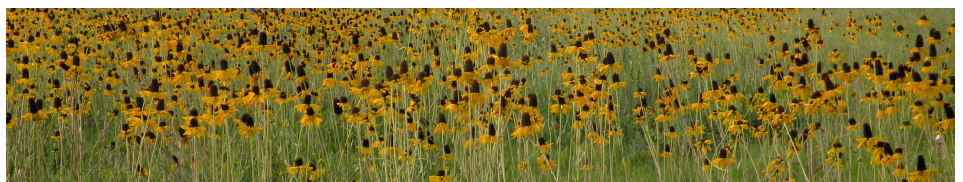
"Native plants cost more"

Native plants actually cost 1/5th of the price to maintain over 10 years compared to non-natives!

CREATE INVITING HABITAT

Save time and money by creating a natural bird-friendly space in your community. Discover the beauty and value of plant species native to the greater-Houston area.

- ✓ Plan for native plants in your new garden, or integrate native plants in your existing garden.
- ✓ Have a conversation with your landscapers. Encourage them to remove invasive plants and start planting natives around your community.
- ✓ Provide water features, bird feeders, and nest boxes to attract more birds and create memorable bird-watching experiences.
- ✓ Encourage community members to help maintain the native plant garden.
- ✓ Make an aesthetically pleasing design to leave a positive impression on your neighbors.



Why Do Native Plants Matter?

Native Plants are HOUSTON STRONG!

Species local to Harris County are more resilient to floods, droughts, and freezes and require less water, pest-control, and fertilizer than ornamental plants.

Pollinator Paradise

More pollinators mean more flowers and fruit, which is great news for vegetable gardens and other flowering plants in the neighborhood.

High Value for a Low Cost

Benefits of native gardens include increased property value, aesthetic beauty, lower maintenance, and a sense of pride in your contributions to a greater cause.

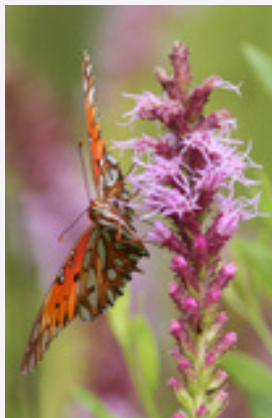


CONNECT WITH OTHERS
